TIMELINE OF NHL HISTORY IN SWEDEN

Jan. 27, 1965: Sweden's **Ulf Sterner** becomes the first European-trained player to appear in an NHL game as his New York Rangers defeat the Boston Bruins, 5-2.

1980: Sweden's **Anders Kallur** and **Stefan Persson** become the first European-trained players to win the Stanley Cup, doing so with the New York Islanders.

Sept. 22-26, 1980: The Minnesota North Stars and Washington Capitals participate in a round-robin preseason tournament against club teams AIK and Djurgarden in Sweden. A Swedish newspaper sponsors the tournament, offering \$28,000 prize for the winner. The Capitals win with a perfect 3-0 record.

June 17, 1989: Sweden's **Mats Sundin** (Quebec Nordiques) becomes the first European player selected first overall in the NHL Draft.

September 1990: The Montreal Canadiens host part of their training camp in Sweden, then travel to the Soviet Union with the Minnesota North Stars for an exhibition tournament.

September 2000: The NHL returns to Sweden as the Vancouver Canucks face Swedish teams Djurgarden, AIK and MoDo at the Globe Arena in Stockholm. The Canucks defeat MoDo and Djurgarden to win the tournament, besting Swedish champ Djurgarden, 2-1 in overtime, in the final. Swedish rookie **Daniel Sedin** scores the game-winning goal to cap a memorable trip. AIK defeats MoDo to claim third place in the tournament.

September 2001: The Colorado Avalanche participate in the 2001 NHL Challenge Series and, as defending Stanley Cup champions, defeat Brynas IF of the Swedish Elite League, 5-3, thanks to an **Alex Tanguay** hat trick.

September 2003: The Toronto Maple Leafs travel to Sweden and Finland for a three-game tour as part of the NHL Challenge Series. Local hero **Mats Sundin** leads the Maple Leafs against Swedish powers Djurgarden and Farjestad as well as Finnish club Jokerit, sweeping all three teams.

February 2006: 151 NHL players represent their countries at the 2006 Olympic Winter Games in Turin, Italy. Sweden defeats Finland in the first gold-medal game between the longtime Scandinavian rivals.

June 2008: Sweden's **Nicklas Lidstrom** (Detroit Red Wings) becomes the first European-born captain to hoist the Stanley Cup. Teammate and fellow Swede **Henrik Zetterberg** becomes the first European-born Conn Smythe Trophy winner as playoff MVP.

Oct. 4-5, 2008: The NHL contests its first regular-season games in Sweden, between the Ottawa Senators and Pittsburgh Penguins at Ericsson Globe in Stockholm. The teams split their two contests.

Oct. 2-3, 2009: The Detroit Red Wings and St. Louis Blues open the 2009-10 season in Stockholm, with the Blues sweeping their two-game series at Ericsson Globe.

Oct. 8-9, 2010: The Columbus Blue Jackets and San Jose Sharks begin the season in Sweden, splitting their two contests at Ericsson Globe.

Oct. 7-8, 2011: The NHL stages season-opening games at Ericsson Globe for the fourth consecutive year, with the Los Angeles Kings defeating the New York Rangers and Anaheim Ducks also beating the Rangers, both in extra time.

September 2016: World Cup of Hockey 2016 pretournament games take place in Europe and North America prior to the opening of the 2016-17 NHL season. Team Sweden opens its training camp in Gothenburg, where it hosts an exhibition game against Team Finland.

November 2017: More than 10 percent of all NHL players in the 2017-18 season are Sweden natives (80 of 790, 10.1%), the highest figure among European nations. The percentage of Swedish-born players in the NHL 30 years ago, in 1987-88, was 3.3%.

Nov. 10-11, 2017: The NHL returns to Ericsson Globe with a pair of games between the Colorado Avalanche and Ottawa Senators, the ninth and 10th regular-season contests played in Sweden.

Oct. 6, 2018: The NHL stages a season-opening game in Europe – and its first regular-season game in Gothenburg, Sweden – for the first time since 2011 when the Edmonton Oilers and New Jersey Devils face off at Scandinavium.

DID YOU KNOW?

* Since 1997, the NHL has staged 28 regular-season games at venues outside North America, with three more scheduled for 2018-19 as part of the 2018 NHL Global Series. A total of 21 teams have played games in six different countries and seven different cities through 2017-18.

* The Edmonton Oilers and New Jersey Devils will become the 22nd and 23rd teams to play a regular-season NHL game outside North America, while Gothenburg, Sweden, will become the eighth different city to host such a contest. Overall, the Oilers-Devils Oct. 6 matchup will be the 11th regular-season NHL game played in Sweden (and 23rd in Europe).

* Total attendance for the League's 28 regular-season games to date at venues outside North America is 374,774 – an average of 13,385 per game.

* Although the Oilers have not played in a regular-season NHL game outside North America, they have contested three preseason contests in the continent – all in 1990. Edmonton defeated Dusseldorf EG, 2-0, on Sept. 7, 1990, in Dusseldorf, West Germany; lost, 10-1, to the St. Louis Blues on Sept. 8, 1990, in Dusseldorf, West Germany; and defeated EC Graz, 12-3, on Sept. 14, 1990, in Graz, Austria.

* A total of 323 Swedish-born players (296 skaters, 27 goaltenders) have appeared in a regular-season or playoff NHL game. That includes 94 (86 skaters, 8 goaltenders) in 2017-18, the most of any non-North American country.

* Swedish-born players from the Oilers and Devils: Edmonton forward **Pontus Aberg** (Stockholm) as well as defensemen **Oscar Klefbom** (Karlstad) and **Adam Larsson** (Skellefteå); New Jersey forwards **Jesper Bratt** (Stockholm) and **Marcus Johansson** (Landskrona) as well as goaltender **Eddie Lack** (Norrtälje). Oilers forward **Jesse Puljujarvi** (Alvkarleby) also was born in Sweden, but represents Finland internationally.

* The NHL has participated in four prior games in Gothenburg, Sweden – all exhibitions – with the most recent such contest on Sept. 30, 2011. In that game, goaltender **Henrik Lundqvist** (Are) and the New York Rangers defeated his former team, Frölunda, and twin brother, **Joel**, 4-2.

* A total of 33 German-born players (28 skaters, 5 goaltenders) have appeared in a regular-season or playoff NHL game. That includes eight (6 skaters, 2 goaltenders) in 2017-18.

* German-born players from the Oilers and Devils: Edmonton forwards **Leon Draisaitl** (Cologne) and **Tobias Rieder** (Landshut).

* The NHL last had teams play in Germany on Oct. 8, 2011, when the Buffalo Sabres and Los Angeles Kings opened the regular season at O2 Berlin Arena in Berlin (4-2 BUF W). Prior to that, the teams played exhibition games in Mannheim and Hamburg, respectively. The Sabres defeated Adler Mannheim, 8-3, at SAP Arena, while the Kings beat Hamburg, 5-4, at O2 World Hamburg Arena. No NHL team has played a game in Cologne.

* A total of 31 Swiss-born players (25 skaters, 6 goaltenders) have appeared in a regular-season or playoff NHL game. That includes 14 (13 skaters, 1 goaltender) in 2017-18.

* Swiss-born players from the Oilers and Devils: New Jersey forward **Nico Hischier** (Brig) and defenseman **Mirco Mueller** (Winterthur).

* The NHL last had a team play in Switzerland on Oct. 3, 2011, when the New York Rangers lost, 8-4, to EV Zug at Bossard Arena in Zug. The last time an NHL team played in Bern was in 2008, when the Rangers faced SC Bern (8-1 W) and Metallurg Magnitogorsk (4-3 W) on Sept. 30 and Oct. 1, respectively – also at PostFinance Arena.

* The Oilers are 21-13-4 in their 38 all-time NHL season openers; the Devils are 22-12-9 in their 43.
